Summary of PPG spending 2013/2014

Objectives in spending PPG:

- To narrow the gap to national expectation for those pupils in receipt of pupil premium
- To ensure that all pupils in receipt of pupil premium make 2 whole levels progress between KS1 and KS2
- To ensure that progress is accelerated for those pupils in receipt of pupil premium
- To enrich the curriculum and provide experiences to enhance progress in academic, social and emotional development
- To support the school's 'Tweak to Transform' project to improve teaching and learning across the school

Summary of expenditure and actions taken for 2013/2014 academic year:

- Additional technology including ipads and set up £4200
- Intervention led by an experienced teacher which supported teaching in Class 2 focussing on reading comprehension and writing - £350
- Subsidising of educational visits to enrich learning opportunities for pupils £500
- Subsciption costs to online reading scheme which can be used at home 'Bug Club' £120
- Training for 'Tweak to Transform' project and release time £350
- Extra support for a child eligible for pupil premium with behaviour needs £1000
- Support by teaching assistants for children eligible for pupil premium £3800

Outcomes to date (13/14):

- There were no FSM pupils in Year 2 nor Year 6 for statutory data summer 2014, however, following the focus on 'tweaks to transform' for learning across the school 100% of Year 6 pupils achieved 2 or more levels progress from KS1 to KS2 in reading, writing and maths
- The ipad technology has provided good motivation in order for this gap to narrowed
- The Bug Club subscription has provided good motivation in order for the gap to be narrowed (2 out of 3 Pupil Premium pupils in July 2014 made 6+ points progress during the year in reading)
- All children across the school have benefitted from a range of trips and experiences linked to their topics this term

Planned spending and actions for 2014/2015 academic year (please note due to mobility as from Sept 14 there are only 3 children still attending the school eligible for PPG)

- To continue to provide support for the payment of trips and visits/residentials to enhance progress in academic (particularly writing), social and emotional development £200
- To continue to support the school's 'Tweak to Transform' project to improve teaching and learning

across the school - £700

- Subscriptions for Bug Club and Phonics Play £200
- Purchase Lego Story Starter to support talk for writing £450
- Purchase materials to support assessment without levels £1000
- Release time talk for writing and course £500
- Supply costs/additional TA hours to enable 'booster groups' to take place £1500
- Support by teaching assistants for groups of children including those eligible for pupil premium -£3000

Outcomes at Christmas 2014

- There are currently 3 pupils eligible for funding, 2 of which have joined us during the autumn term. 2 out of the 3 pupils are above aged related expectations in writing, reading and mathematics.
- All children across the school have benefitted from a range of trips and experiences linked to their topics this term e.g. visit to Castle Drogo, visit to a farm, taking part in a 'Musical in a Day'.
 These experiences have helped to support their 'talk for writing'.

Outcomes at Easter 2015

- There are currently 3 pupils eligible for funding
- A year 6 pupil who is eligible for funding has had 'booster' sessions in readiness for the SATs
- The funding for a residential visit to The Eden Project (linked to Rainforest topic) for eligible pupils was provided by PP funding

Outcomes at Summer 2015

- There are currently 3 pupils eligible for funding
- A year 6 pupil who is eligible for funding has had 'booster' sessions in readiness for the SATs
- The funding for a residential visit to Beam House (PGL) for eligible pupils was provided by PP funding
- All children across the school have benefitted from a range of trips and experiences linked to their topics this term e.g. visit to Lyme Regis, taking part in a 'Musical in a Day' linked to their topic of StoneAge. These experiences have helped to support their 'talk for writing'.
- Disadvantaged KS2 pupils had an average point score equal to or above the national score for other pupils in reading and writing
- The proportion of disadvantaged KS2 pupils that attained at least level 4 was equal to or above the national figure for other pupils in reading, writing and mathematics
- The proportion of disadvantaged KS2 pupils that attained at least level 5 was equal to or above the national figure for other pupils in reading and writing.
