School facts

1. How many hours of PE do each class receive?

Branscombe - Class 2 - 2 hours PE with Arsenal Soccer School every week. Class 1-1 hour session plus 4 x 20 minutes sessions per week

Broadhembury – Class 2 - 2hours per week Class 1-1 hour session plus 3x20min sessions per week.

Farway – 1 hour PE with Arsenal Soccer School every week. 45 minutes extra lesson of forest school or PE.

Plus Extra

Maypole dancing (each school approximately 4 x 1hr, 1st half summer term)

Plus additional events and some extra fitness using Cybercoach as time allows.

Other events have included, bikeability, forest school, sports days including whole federation and whole learning community sports days. The Learning Community have also organised the following events that pupils have attended handball, gymnastics, cross country, dance, co-ordination events which involved trampolining activities

2. How many after /hours Schools Clubs are available?

Branscombe – After school Netball and Football

Broadhembury – Arsenal Soccer School, Lunchtime Multi Skills/football Club, rounder's, ball skills.

Farway – Lunch time football

Overall impact

Briefly explain the schools rationale for the distribution of the PE Sports Premium funding

PE Provision was a Key Area of this year's School Improvement Plan within that there were sub areas of

- To provide a member of staff who can be used to transfer expertise from outside involvement and share good practice.
- To employ a member of staff to allow a new curriculum across the federation – 'Forest school' to promote the love of outdoor activity and healthy lifestyle.
- To promote a sense of team work and community for the children across the federation.
- To develop interschool competitive provision for the pupils
- To develop PE teaching with new facilities at Broadhembury
- To encourage pupil participation in leading play activities
- To give children experiences of a variety of sports.

Progress

Evidence of the quality of PE and the progress of all children

1. Quality of teaching and learning

In two of the schools the PE is supported by Arsenal Soccer school which means the children are having lessons taken by sport specialists. In the third school, where a new village hall has meant

better facilities have been available since Sept. 15, the quality of teaching has therefore been improved. Forest school is also offered to support outdoor education and promote the idea of learning through being active out of doors.

2. Progress of learners

Children are making progress and developing their skills which are particularly shown in competitive sports. Tracking is used on a weekly basis, not only in the PE objectives but also in their attitudes to PE. ARSENAL soccer school use the initials of A.R.S.E.N.A.L to encourage this e.g. R is respect, L is learning, S is skill.

Teachers monitor progress as part of their lesson and perform at the end of unit e.g. May Day, Gym sequences and dance at the end of unit. In swimming children can achieve badges for distance and water skills. General confidence has improved due to outdoor education/forest school provision – the school learning animals have also been a focus during forest school provision.

3. What professional development for PE and Sports has been used to support the quality of provision

The PE Coordinator has attended some Learning community cluster meetings.

Using the Sainsbury Games as a tool.

TAs and teachers have observed Arsenal Coaches and Premier Sports Coaches and gained skills as a result

CPD has been provided through the membership of Exeter Consortium e.g. playtime training In order to inspire children to be the best they can at sport, children were taken to watch the Tour of Britain and an Olympic athlete came into school to train with the children and talk to them about their career.

4. What increase in the numbers involved in extra curriculum Sports and activities

There is more opportunity now to do clubs and this continues to be something all three schools are developing.

5. Numbers involved

Intervention

6. What intervention programmes have been used to support and engage the least active and most vulnerable children?

Branscombe - Sponsored Run Sport relief mile – all children involved in the challenge. Provision put in place following Playtime Training

Broadhembury – Physio program given to two children to ensure prolonged mobility. Fun fit program delivered to targeted children. One child has one to one swimming lessons.

Farway – Physio Program being followed for a child

Children attend the Learning Community sessions for SEN e.g. trampolining, SEN events during Learning Community Sports Day.

7. What has been the impact of this intervention work on the children?

We follow the guidance from other professionals following their physiotherapy programs, and follow 'funfit' programs with some children. These include targets for coordination, flexibility and strength.

Confidence from being able to participate in SEN Learning Community PE events.

This has helped to support children with mobility difficulties in PE lessons, it has meant that they have the confidence and are more able to access the PE curriculum and show progress during the sequence of PE, this is evident in the lesson observations made by teachers and Arsenal Soccer school.

Future Plans

To develop outdoor adventurous opportunities across the Federation.

To encourage pupil participation in leading play activities.

To monitor Olympic spend.

To develop PE teaching with new facilities at Broadhembury.

To track the PE provision and celebrate as a school community.

To develop interschool provision for the pupils.

To audit consumable resources at Branscombe and Farway.

To monitor PE teaching across the Federation and review supporting provider.

To organise Federation events, e.g. skittles competition and Olympic Games.

To retain our Bronze award and strive for silver from School Games.

Sustainability

Use of sports coaches to up skill school staff and to share and continue expertise.

The purchase of resources for continued use across the Federation.

Training staff in extracurricular activity for example playground sport and games.

Developing PE coordinator role across the Federation, as part of the School Development Plan, to ensure a high quality of PE provision.

Staff trained in specific PE intervention such as 'Funfit' and physio programs.
