Dear Parents,

On Tuesday this week, Branscombe school had their first "Ready, Steady, Write" day of this academic year. The focus of the day was the story of Noah's Ark, which both classes have been learning about in their RE lessons this term. The day began with the children acting out the story, some playing the parts of Noah and his family and others playing the parts of the animals. There was some discussion about how it might have felt on the Ark and Miss Moss made a rainbow, using Skittles and warm water.





Then, the children chose from three activities: making model animals from play dough, painting pictures of their chosen animals or weaving a rainbow. Later the children worked in their classes to discuss the story further and then wrote in role as one of the characters from the story. Class 1 wrote diary entries and Class 2 planned and wrote a story about one of the animals and what happened to them on the Ark. At the end of the day the children had the opportunity to share their artwork and writing and also talked about the Learning Powers they had used: the perseverance of tortoises, the absorption of beavers and the imagining of the unicorn.

On Wednesday this week, Class 1 joined Farway and Broadhembury in a trip to Honiton Leisure

Centre for a Gymnastics workshop led by the Honiton Learning Community. The children really enjoyed the experience and had great fun learning new skills. The children had the opportunity to use different pieces of equipment as well as learning new skills such as balancing in different ways and completing forward rolls at different levels. They were asked to work in small groups to have a go at all sorts of exciting challenges and by the end of the session, were able to combine all that they had accomplished to perform a small routine. Well done Class 1 -Miss Harvey-Jones was very proud of both your behaviour and the effort that you demonstrated towards your learning.



Class 2 have had several visits from a friend of Miss Moss this week, mosaic artist Lucy Tyte, who came to work with the children on their final projects in this term's Art project, making mosaics using tiles. Each of the children designed and made a pot stand, using square tiles to create patterns. This has given them the opportunity to develop lots of new skills and has required lots of concentration!

Next week is a very busy one. Monday both Classes have a session with the National Trust (please see the further notice below regarding this) and next Thursday is our Federation Roman day for the KS2 children at Farway Primary School. We are very much looking forward to the Roman Road-Show and feast. You should have received a letter and SOE3 for this event. Please see Alice if not.

Also next week is our parents' evening; Miss Moss and Miss Harvey-Jones are looking forward to talking to you about your child's progress. Time slots should be with you by early next week.

Free School Meals

From September 2014, all children in Reception, Year 1 and Year 2 in state-funded schools in England are eligible for free school meals. Some of these children would also be eligible under the current free school meals scheme and it is very important that we still identify these pupils. This is because each child registered under the original scheme attracts valuable funding for their school.

We therefore ask that you complete a free school meal registration form (available from the office) and return it to the school in order for us to identify whether you would have been entitled under the current free school meals scheme, even if you do not actually wish your child to have a free school meal.
