Dear Parents,

Class 1 have made an enthusiastic start to their topic. They have been finding out about London, locating it on a map of England and identifying it as being the capital city of England. The children have found out about how important London was in 1666 and why this makes 'The Great Fire of London' such a significant event in the history of our country. The children have studied images of London in 1666 and present-day London and discussed the similarities and differences, paying particular attention to the buildings.

In music the children were introduced to the rhyme 'London's Burning' which they were particularly keen to learn how to sing; they even had a go at singing it in a round. The children discussed the terms 'rhythm' and 'tune' and practised clapping the rhythm as they sang the tune. The children then went on to change the words, replacing them with their own ideas. In Literacy Class 1 have started to look at diary writing and have used a text map to learn part of a diary entry written by Samuel Pepys during the time of 'The Great Fire of London'. In Maths the Reception children have been busy learning about numbers up to 20. Year 1 have been identifying how groups have been sorted and deciding how to sort groups of objects themselves. Year 2 have been busy counting and learning how to write numbers up to 100 in numerals and words.

This week, in their Literacy learning, the children of Class 2 have been exploring the text "My Secret War Diary" which is an account of the events of World War 2, told from the point of view of a 9-year-old girl writing in her diary. The book was written by Marcia Williams, with the support of Flossie Albright, who was once the little girl at the centre of this story. The children have enjoyed learning more about what life might have been like for a child in that period, as well as enjoying the lively and entertaining way the narrator recounts her story.

They have noticed some of the devices that she uses to make her writing so entertaining and to help the reader understand the sequence of events and begun to practise using some of these in their own diary writing. In particular, the children have focused this week on using time and place adverbials to add detail to their sentences and they have practised identifying and correcting non-standard English- especially developing correct use of pronouns such as 'I' and 'me' or verb forms such as using 'done' instead of 'did' or 'ain't' instead of 'isn't'. However the children noticed that the author's deliberate use of non-standard English in this text makes it all the more entertaining to read. Later in this sequence of work, they will have a go at writing in someone else's voice and thinking about the sorts of vocabulary different characters might use.

In this week's Geography lesson, the children practised giving directions using the 8 points of a compass. They also looked at Ordnance Survey maps and learned how to express locations on a map using 4-figure or six-figure grid references. Later this term, the children will hopefully have more opportunities to put this learning into practice with some practical orienteering exercises.

International Cross of Nails School

We are very excited to share with you the news that we have been accepted as an International Cross of Nails School – linking with Coventry Cathedral. During the Second World War Coventry Cathedral was bombed. In the ruins the following morning two charred beams were found laying in the shape of a cross. Later, this was displayed in the preserved ruins with the words 'Father Forgive' inscribed in the surviving stonework behind it. A local priest also made another cross from three of the many fifteenth century nails that littered the scene. It was quickly decided to preserve the ruins and build a modern cathedral next to them. I visited this over the summer and it is a very inspiring place. In the earliest days after the bombing the Cross of Nails, which is now displayed on the new altar, became a symbol of peace and hope. The Cross of Nails Community includes schools, communities, parishes and other organisations who have shown a commitment to the values of peace, hope and reconciliation. We shared some of the work we have been doing in worship and throughout our school and federation with the cathedral team and we will be presented with our own Cross of Nails in a very special service in a couple of weeks.

The service will take place on Monday 24th September at 1.30pm. It would be lovely if lots of parents and members of the community could join us for the service. We would like to have refreshments back in school afterwards so we would be very grateful for contributions of cakes and biscuits on the morning.

The children will be able to tell you more about The Cross of Nails Community, and there is a lovely display in the entrance hall – please have a look.

PARENT GOVERNOR ELECTION

There is a vacancy for a parent governor on our federation's governing body and I am writing to invite nominations to fill this vacancy. Please think about becoming a governor, or encouraging others to volunteer.

Parent governors (governors who are parents of school aged children at the start of their term of office) are welcomed as valued members of the governor team and play an important role; the governing body works together as a group, meeting at least once every half term. Together they are responsible for the strategic direction of the school, promoting high standards of educational achievement and ensuring our resources are used to maximum impact. Life as a governor is interesting and varied and we feel sure that there are parents prepared to take on this important role and give their time and commitment to helping us to continue to improve the school's performance.

In looking to fill this vacancy the governors of the school have identified the following skills, experience and attributes that they feel would help strengthen the governing body:

- Experience of governance
- Financial management expertise
- HR, procurement or property management experience

Training and support will be available to help you develop into the role. This will include in-house mentoring and support as well as access to external governor training; those new to being a governor are expected to attend induction training. The term of office for parent governors is 4 years. If you would like to stand for election please complete and sign the enclosed nomination form and return to the school office no later than 12 noon on Monday 1st October. If you wish you can include a few details about yourself and why you would like to become a governor (not exceeding 100 words). This will then be circulated to all parents to help them decided who to vote for if an election is required. You do not have to complete this section, but if you don't you may put yourself at a disadvantage if there is an election. An election, by secret ballot, will be held if more nominations are received than the number of vacancies. If an election is needed details of the procedure will be sent to all parents.

Nominations must be from parents or carers with children at the school on the day that nominations close. The enclosed sheet summarises the disqualification criteria to serve as a governor. Anyone standing for election must certify that he/she is not disqualified for any reason. Parents/carers who have paid employment in the school for 500 hours per academic year or more or who are elected members of the Local Authority are not eligible to stand in these elections.

Disqualification criteria

A person is disqualified from holding or from continuing to hold office as a governor or associate member if he or she:

- fails to attend the governing body meetings without the consent of the governing body for a continuous period of six months, beginning with the date of the first meeting missed (not applicable to ex officio governors);
- · is subject to a bankruptcy restriction order, an interim bankruptcy restriction order, a debt relief order or an interim debt relief order;
- · has had his or her estate sequestrated and the sequestration order has not been discharged, annulled or reduced;
- · is subject to:
- I. a disqualification order or disqualification undertaking under the Company Directors Disqualification Act 1986
- II. a disqualification order under Part 2 of the Companies (Northern Ireland) Order 1989
- III. a disqualification undertaking accepted under the Company Directors Disqualification (Northern Ireland) Order 2002
- IV. an order made under Section 429(2)(b) of the Insolvency Act 1986 (failure to pay under a County Court administration order);
- has been removed from the office of charity trustee or trustee for a charity by the Charity Commissioners or High Court on grounds of any misconduct or mismanagement, or under Section 34 of the Charities and Trustees Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 from participating in the management or control of any body;
- is included in the list of people considered by the Secretary of State as unsuitable to work with children;
- is disqualified from working with children or subject to a direction under Section 142 of the Education Act 2002;
- · is disqualified from registration for childminding or providing day care;
- · is disqualified from registration under Part 3 of the Childcare Act 2006;
- · has received a sentence of imprisonment (whether suspended or not) for a period of not less than three months (without the option of a fine) in the five years before becoming a governor or since becoming a governor;
- has received a prison sentence of two-and-a-half years or more in the 20 years before becoming a governor;
- · has at any time received a prison sentence of five years or more;
- · has been fined for causing a nuisance or disturbance on school premises during the five years prior to or since appointment or election as a governor;
- refuses to allow an application to the Disclosure and Barring Service (DBS) for a DBS check.
