Dear Parents,

In Literacy this week, the children in Class One have been planning and writing instructions for 'How to Catch a Wolf'. They have thought carefully about a 'you will need' list and have written some step by step instructions using imperative verbs. They have enjoyed learning the text using a text map and actions.

In Maths the children in Class One, have been busy measuring and comparing lengths using a ruler and a metre stick. They have had a go at measuring each other, and have talked about who is the shortest/tallest and how they know. They have also been busy measuring the height of our lettuce plants to see how well they are growing.

In Science the children have been involved in planning and setting up an experiment to test their ideas on what plants need in order to grow and stay healthy. Over the next few weeks they will be watching to see if their predictions are correct.

In our topic work, the children in Class One have been looking at rainforests and finding out about the different layers of a rainforest and the animals that make their homes in each layer. They have started to make a rainforest collage, to show what they have learnt.

This week, Class 2 at Branscombe have begun a new Literacy sequence of work, in which the children will be reading a range of biographies of women who have changed the world. This week, the children discussed the celebrations in London last weekend to celebrate one hundred years since women in Britain were given the vote. The topic will inevitably give the children the opportunity to develop their awareness of contributions made by some impressive women in history but also the chance to discuss ongoing issues of justice and equality.

Following last weekend's Soccer Aid football match, the children began the topic this week by finding out more about the past life and future ambitions of the famous sprinter Usain Bolt, and then had a go at writing his biography, giving them a chance to write about at least one man before immersing themselves in biographies about women! The first biography the children explored was that of Hatshepsut, who ruled Egypt as pharaoh for twenty years in place of her infant nephew.

On Wednesday, Class Two joined together with the Key Stage 2 children from across the Federation on a visit to the Royal Albert Memorial Museum in Exeter. During this visit, a group of volunteers guided the children in a range of activities to develop their knowledge and understanding of the Ancient Egyptian civilisation. The children attended 'Scribe School', where they learned more about hieroglyphics, as well as the materials used by ancient Egyptians for writing. They were able to handle papyrus, looked at a replica of the famous Rosetta stone and learned that, while Egyptian writing could be written in just about any direction, there is a special trick to knowing which direction to read in...!







The children also learned to play a version of the Ancient Egyptian strategy game, Senet, although they did not gamble on the outcome as the ancient Egyptians used to do! They were given the opportunity to practise their skills of mummification on a cloth dummy, removing its brains through its nostrils and its organs through a slit in its lower abdomen, before wrapping the organs, reinserting them in the body and wrapping the mummy in bandages. Finally, the children were taken on a tour of some of the Ancient Egyptian artefacts in the Museum, where they saw a real (three thousand year old) mummy in a mock tomb, as well as various other ancient treasures. During the tour, many of the children were fascinated by glimpses into other rooms in the museum and many of them expressed an interest in visiting again.

# Rainbows

After a shower of rain we sometimes see a magnificent rainbow arched across the sky.

- rainbows are the reflection of the sun in the rain droplets in the sky
- · they are curved because raindrops are round
- they are multi-coloured because each raindrop splits the sunlight into a spectrum of colours
- the colours of the rainbow are always in the same order – red, orange, yellow, green, blue, indigo and violet – and red is highest in the sky
- an easy way to remember the order is using the mnemonic 'Richard Of York Gave Battle In Vain'.
   The first letter of each word is also the first letter of the colour.
