Dear Parents,

We welcome Miss Moss back to the new school term. We are all pleased she is now feeling much better!

On Thursday next week we would like to invite you all to our termly Eucharist service in church at 9.45am. This will be an extra special service because the Archdeacon of Exeter will be joining us to present the school with their 'Outstanding' SIAMS certificate. It would be lovely to have parents and friends of the school at the church.

In prehistoric P.E./dance lessons this week the children in Class 1 have enjoyed using their bodies to become dinosaurs! They began by discussing the different types of dinosaurs, and their features. They noticed that some were big, whilst others were small; some slow and some fast; certain dinosaurs were solitary, whilst others hunted in packs, and much more! They thought about how some dinosaurs could fly, whilst others swam, walked or ran. After choosing six dinosaurs to mimic, the children thought about what they would look like and how they would move in the wild: A T-Rex is big, fast and fierce, and a Stegosaurus is a slow, spiky pack animal, whilst an Ammonite lives in a curled shell with squid-like tentacles, to propel himself along.

After a little practice, the music was turned on and the children were asked to move around. Their focus was to concentrate on maintaining good spatial awareness, changing direction and levels, whilst also listening for instructions to get into the character of the appropriate dinosaur. Following this, the children were put into pairs to make up their own dance moves, to demonstrate being the creatures that they imagined would have lived under the sea, 150 million years ago! The children did so well with their choreography throughout the sessions that Miss Harvey-Jones did wonder at times if she had a classroom of children, or pterosaurs!

In Music, the children have been talking about the pulse in our body, and how it makes a regular pattern, sometimes getting faster and sometimes slower. They compared their own pulse, to the pulse or beat of a piece of music, whilst they listened to a variety of pieces of recorded music. Developing upon this, the children were asked to sing some songs with a strong pulse, such as 'The Grand Old Duke of York', and 'Mary had a Little Lamb', patting their knees to the beat, as they practised keeping in time with it. They learnt the dinosaur version of '10 Little Indians', and used soft percussion instruments to beat in time to the pulse. For a second time this week, the

rhythm of the music took over, as the children noticed that music with a strong pulse/beat, makes you want to move along with it, tapping your feet and dancing!

In quieter circle-time sessions, the children have been talking about how they feel and thinking about the words that they know, to describe different feelings, as they investigated the British Value of Individual Liberty. They looked in a mirror to make different faces, to represent their feelings, and then showed them to their partners, discussing what they noticed about how a person's face changes, when you show a different emotion. The children talked about times that they might have felt different emotions, and drew pictures of themselves using light and dark, to show how they felt.

The children were also particularly enthusiastic to take part in the R.E. session this week, where they thought about bridges, and what their purpose is. After listening to the story of 'The Three Billy Goats Gruff', and thinking about how the bridge saved the goats, the children looked at pictures of bridges, and used them to consider different reasons and situations, when a bridge might be needed or be useful. They thoroughly enjoyed completing their challenge to 'bridge' gaps by building their own bridges, and Miss Harvey-Jones was impressed with their contributions to a debate, upon whether or not a person could 'bridge a gap'.

This week, Class 2 have developed their understanding of the solar system, and have begun to create a computer simulation to demonstrate how the Earth orbits the sun. In Maths, as part of their current "Geometric reasoning" sequence of work, Year 6 have undertaken a challenge to make a 3D spacecraft or rocket out of card, by creating nets and using these to build a spacecraft design. They were challenged to create an **algorithm** (set of instructions), that others might use to recreate their design. The children in years 3 and 4 undertook a similar challenge, to create a 2D picture of a rocket or spaceship, and then label features such as the shapes, angles, lines (vertical, horizontal, parallel, perpendicular) and lines of symmetry, before writing their own step-by-step algorithm, to recreate their design. In Art, the children were challenged to use oil or chalk pastels to draw a picture of the moon from close observation of photographs of the surface of the moon.
