

Dear Parents

This has been another busy week! In English lessons, the children in Class 1 have begun their learning of our new text 'The Sand Horse'; they were impressed by the interesting words that the author had used to describe the coast of Cornwall and the Sand Horse's feelings and have been collecting their own set of wow words. In maths they have been learning to recognise and use money, finding totals and giving change.

Challenge: Can any children bring in a receipt to show Miss Harvey-Jones how they have added up the cost of items to find a total and then subtracted this from what they paid with to find the change given? Did any cashiers make a mistake?

Class 1 are continuing to think about pirates in their Topic lessons, imagining what their life at sea would be like. The children have found out about life (and jobs) on board the pirate ship to be able to write diary entries as if they had spent a day with Blackbeard or Anne Bonny.

On Monday, the Class 2 children went into Exeter for an Exe Valley Challenge practice walk along the river. After being dropped off at Exeter Crematorium, the class were joined by several

children from Broadhembury school and the group walked a short distance along the route and then stopped for a picnic lunch. After lunch, the children walked along the river to the quay and back. Although they did not complete the whole route or distance that the children will walk during Sunday's challenge, it gave them the chance to develop familiarity with the area and build some walking stamina. Most of class 2 will be taking part in this 7 mile (Year 4 and 5) or 10-mile (Year 6) walking challenge on Sunday and we wish them all well at this event.





On Thursday afternoon, Miss Moss and Year 6 went to a special Life Skills workshop at the Donkey Sanctuary. They took part in a range of activities designed to remind and teach them about ways of taking care of their own safety and that of those around them. They thought about keeping safe on a journey to school, keeping safe around animals, fire safety in the home, hygiene and hand-washing, internet safety, keeping safe on the beach, how to contact the emergency

services and the dangers and consequences of making hoax or prank calls. The activities were led by members of organisations such as the police, RNLI, BT, the food standards agency and the fire service and included various quizzes and demonstrations as well as talks and question and answer sessions. Have the children completed the homework they were given and asked their parents to help them test the smoke alarms in their homes? Next week, in our PSHE work, Class 2 will be visited by the school nurse, who will be talking to the children about the importance of cleanliness and hygiene.

The children in Class 2 are studying Ancient Greeks and The Olympics this term and so we are **hoping** to have a joint federation Olympics at Branscombe on 20th July for the whole school. We will send out further information when things have been confirmed.


