Dear Parents,

In Literacy this week, Class 1 have enjoyed listening to and reciting dinosaur poems. They began the week by exploring 'The King of all the Dinosaurs' by Paul Cookson, picking out the rhyming words, before thinking about the body parts of their favourite dinosaurs. They then came up with their own list of dinosaur-like adjectives, to describe the body parts of different types of dinosaur, for which they tried to find appropriate rhyming words. Following this, they used their notes to build noun-phrases to describe their own dinosaur, organising these in a poetic style similar to that of the authors. The children thoroughly enjoyed listening to "Wayne the Stegosaurus" by Kenn Nesbitt, appreciating the humour in this poem, and even had a go at rapping about dinosaurs!

In Topic lessons, inspired by learning about Mary Anning, the children have been finding out more about fossils. They looked at fossils collected from the beach, to describe the feel of them, and the shapes that they could see. They found out about the work that palaeontologists undertake, and the type of rock that fossils are found in. Our EYFS children made their very own shell and fossil shop, just like Mary; they labelled their goods with the prices that they wanted to charge, and got out the money and tills, to practise counting money and giving change.

On Tuesday, as part of Safer Internet Day 2018, the children earned their stripes for their cyber safety rainbows, by completing a number of class and individual challenges. They were awarded their first stripe after thinking about 'online opportunities'; discussing what they enjoy using the online world for, and coming up with rules and regulations that they have encountered, either in school or at home around the use of these things, which help them to stay safe when online. Next, they played a 'Trust it Traffic Lights' game where they were asked to identify some key features of people, websites and attachments that they can trust. After deciding upon what is reliable information available online, they were awarded their second stripe. Following this, the children were able to earn stripe number three, when they learnt about the importance of keeping personal information private- sharing only made up nicknames, and creating passwords to protect their details. They then played a game of 'feels alright...feels all wrong' to help them to think about situations when they might feel unsure, uncomfortable or that something wasn't right. They learnt who they could go to for help, when they want to voice their concerns, in order to achieve stripe number four. Finally they listened to and watched a range of scenarios, in which they had to give advice, acting as an 'agony aunt' or 'mentor', and making appropriate decisions to earn their last stripe.

This week, Class 2 have worked hard to complete a range of pieces of work, that will soon be going on display in the classroom, so do pop in after half term, to have a look at the children's work. The children have 'published' the reports they researched and wrote last week, about an aspect of space, on topics ranging from stars, to planets, to nebulae, to the International Space Station.

They have begun a new sequence of work in Literacy, in which they are reading and writing stories, set in imaginary worlds. They began by asking "What if...?" questions, to stimulate ideas for a story set in a context that is slightly - or vastly - different from Earth as we know it. The

children have practised writing the opening of the story they planned, focusing on introducing the characters and describing the setting. After half term, they will continue this sequence of work by looking at a range of stories, and using images to inspire and develop their confidence in writing descriptively.

In their Maths work this week, the Year 3 and 4 children, practised telling the time on analogue and digital clocks, converting between 12-hour and 24-hour times, and solving problems by converting between different time intervals. Meanwhile, the Year 6 children, have been developing their knowledge of the relationship between metric and imperial measurements of length, distance, capacity and weight, and solving problems involving conversion from metric to imperial, and vice versa.

In the afternoons, Class 2 have spent some time learning a range of songs, in preparation for the Sidmouth Learning Community Music Festival event, on Thursday evening. All the children attended the rehearsal on Thursday morning, so that they all benefited from the valuable experience of singing in a large choir, alongside pupils from several other local schools. In the evening a smaller group of Branscombe pupils headed back to Sidmouth



College, to perform in a special concert and really did the school proud, especially with their rendition of "Let's Go Fly a Kite" from Mary Poppins. They may have been the



smallest choir but they certainly showed the great talent we have amongst our little school! Many thanks to the parents who joined us at this event, and facilitated the children's participation and to Miss Moss who supported them with their preparation.

Class 2 have also been developing their use of a sketch book, in Art this week. Having looked at a range of example pages from artists' sketch books, the children were introduced to the work of two "Science fiction" artists, whose work involves a space-theme: Peter Thorpe and John Conrad Berkey. The children were then asked to produce a page in their sketch book, to record their thoughts, observations and learning, about one or both of the artists. Later in the term, having practised drawing their own imaginary rockets and spaceships, and explored a range of marbling techniques to produce space-themed background, the children will be challenged to produce their own work of "Science fiction" art, inspired by the work of these artists.

We hope you all have a relaxing half term break, and we look forward to seeing the children back at school, on Monday 19th February
